Laurie Garrett is currently a medical and science writer for *Newsday* in New York City, where she has been since 1988. She is the only writer ever to have been awarded all three of the Big "Ps" of journalism: The Peabody, The Polk (twice), and The Pulitzer. Ms Garrett is the author of *The Coming Plague: Newly Emerging Diseases in a World Out of Balance* and *Betrayal of Trust: The Collapse of Global Public Health*. In 1980, she joined National Public Radio as a Science Correspondent, during which time, she received awards from the National Press Club (Best Consumer Journalism, 1982), the San Francisco Media Alliance (Meritorious Achievement Award in Radio, 1983), and the World Hunger Alliance (First Prize, Radio, 1987). Ms. Garrett has written for many publications, including *Foreign Affairs*, *Esquire*, *Vanity Fair*, *The Los Angeles Times*, *The Washington Post*, and *Current Issues in Public Health*. She has also appeared frequently on national television programs, including "ABC Nightline," "The Jim Lehrer NewsHour," "The Charlie Rose Show," "The Oprah Winfrey Show," "Dateline," "The International Hour" (CNN), and "Talkback (CNN)". She graduated with honors in biology from the University of California in Santa Cruz. She attended graduate school in the Department of Bacteriology and Immunology at UC Berkeley.

George Strait was most recently Senior Vice President, Media Distribution, of The Dr. Spock Company. He joined The Dr. Spock Company after nearly 22 years at ABC News, where he spent 16 years as chief medical correspondent on health and science matters. He contributed to World News Tonight with Peter Jennings and Nightline on issues such as healthcare reform, medical/ethical concerns regarding new technologies, and AIDS. Twice Mr. Strait received his industry's highest award- the Alfred I. duPont Award- for a groundbreaking series on women's health and a documentary on AIDS in minority communities. Mr. Strait has served on several boards of trustees, including Wesleyan University's, and is immediate past board chairperson of the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation, a private philanthropic trust dedicated to improving the health and life chances of the disadvantaged. He graduated from Boston University with a B.A. degree in Biology and completed an M.S. program in Biochemical Genetics at Atlanta University.
