

Mark Dybul, MD, is currently on detail from the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to the Planning Task Force for President Bush's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief. In HHS, Dr. Dybul is the Assistant Director for Medical Affairs, National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), National Institutes of Health (NIH), Co-Executive Secretary of the HHS HIV therapy guidelines for adults and adolescents, the lead for HHS for President Bush's initiative to prevent mother-to-child transmission of HIV in Africa and the Caribbean and a Staff Clinician in the Laboratory of Immunoregulation, NIAID/NIH. Dr. Dybul is a former member of the World Health Organization's Writing Committee to develop global HIV therapy guidelines. He is the principal investigator for clinical and basic research for U.S. and international protocols with an emphasis on HIV therapy, particular those that may be applicable in resource-poor settings including intermittent therapy, and HIV reservoirs and immunopathogenesis. Dr. Dybul received his AB (1985) and MD (1992) from Georgetown University, Washington, DC before completing his residency in internal medicine at the University of Chicago Hospitals (1995) and a fellowship in infectious diseases at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (1998).
